I have the honour to make this statement on behalf of 12 non-governmental organizations who have been supporting the Council's work on the Draft Guiding Principles (DGPs) on Extreme Poverty and Human rights.

First of all, we congratulate and welcome the Independent Expert's report and recommendations on how to improve the DGPs. The annotated outline included in the report reflects the many comments received over the last three years of consultations with all stakeholders, as set out in the three reports compiled by the OHCHR in 2008 and 2009.<sup>1</sup> As requested by many stakeholders, it underlines the added-value of the DGPs, sets out the implications of existing human rights instruments for people living in extreme poverty, is concrete and action-oriented, and fully recognizes the responsibilities of the various actors at national and international levels.

The process started almost 10 years ago when the Commission on Human Rights stressed the need to develop guiding principles on the implementation of existing human rights norms and standards in the context of the fight against extreme poverty. We have now reached the point where a final product is in sight.

And the moment could not be more opportune. The international community is still struggling to respond to the financial and food crises. At the same time, governments will soon begin preparing the UN's agenda for post-2015. These guiding principles, if finalized, could serve as a useful tool for evaluating and improving on the MDGs, as well as developing countermeasures against future crises.

As often repeated in the past decade, extreme poverty is one of the most serious human rights challenges for the international community. It is a human-made tragedy and thus can be reversed with sufficient political will and appropriate policies. We therefore appreciate the fact that the

Independent Expert recalls the numerous binding obligations and political commitments which underline the shared responsibility for the eradication of extreme poverty and the need for global partnership.

In order for the guidelines to become a regular basis for decision-making in anti-poverty programmes, we would recommend the addition in the final text of a section on monitoring, which would emphasize the importance of developing indicators and benchmarks, and making use of existing mechanisms at the national and international level to review their application by the States themselves, national human rights institutions, and CSOs, as well as by the treaty bodies, Special Procedures, and the Universal Periodic Review.

Therefore we urge the Council to:

- 1) maintain the deadline of 2012 for finalizing the guiding principles
- 2) to this end, mandate the Independent Expert on human rights and extreme poverty to prepare a final draft according to her proposed outline
- 3) request the OHCHR to hold consultations with all stakeholders on the new outline as soon as possible and to provide the necessary support to the Independent Expert
